C. STUDENT QUESTIONS

1. Was the 1st Thanksgiving celebrated in 1621? Explain your answer.
2. When did the feast we remember between the pilgrims and the natives actually take place? How long did it last?
3. We have a particular image of the clothing worn by pilgrims. What is our image? How does it differ from what they probably would have worn?
4. Who set the date for the current celebration of Thanksgiving? When is it celebrated in the United States?
5. Where did the pilgrims originally hope to settle in America? Why did they change their plans?
6. In Edward Winslow's journal from 1621, a large amount of "fowl" was killed. How long did he estimate it would last? How many deer did the "Indians" kill and bring to the feast? How many men accompanied Massasoit?
7. Another Thanksgiving has sometimes been acknowledged as the first European Thanksgiving in America. Where was this? When? Describe it.
8. Did the pilgrims eat pumpkin pie and mashed potatoes with gravy at their feast with the Wampanoag in 1621? What were some items that were definitely on their menu?
9. What kinds of spices did pilgrims use in their cooking? What was the most common method of cooking? What other method(s) did they use, and what kinds of foods were they able to preserve?
10. When did the pilgrims have their big daily meal? What was it called? What was breakfast generally like?
